INTO THE HEART OF THE RIVERINA

Situated on the picturesque Edward River and surrounded by a stunning stretch of towering river gums, Moulamein is a charming destination that boasts a delightful collection of attractions to discover and explore.

Known as the oldest town in the Riverina, Moulamein is rich in history and tells the story of the early settlers, shearers, farmers, the meeting of the rivers and more. It's the ideal getaway for families on a budget and for those looking to escape the hustle and bustle of the city.

Day 1

GET IN EARLY, THERE IS A LOT TO EXPLORE.



Hit the road early, we recommend making the most of your time in and around Moulamein after a 4.5hr drive from Melbourne.

Once you arrive in town, have set up camp or settled into your accommodation, head into town for a coffee and cake at the Art Gallery or a refreshment at the local Café. There's always something interesting in the gallery, which features art and craft from local artists.

Now it's time to get active and start exploring! Take a walk around the 15-hectare Moulamein Lake or partake in a number of water sports. Whether you want to slow down with a leisurely swim, a spot of fishing or kayaking, or ramp up the action with the more adrenaline fuelled water sports, Moulamein Lake has you covered.

Must do's:

- Explore the Moulamein River Walk, which traces the Edward River and beautiful Billabong Creek. It's full of native wildlife and fauna, and also holds great cultural significance to the landscape of the local Aboriginal community – the Wamba Wamba people.
- Big Tree is believed to be the largest living red gum in Australia, over 300 years old. It has an impressive circumference of more than 11 metres, which you need to see to believe!
- Learn all about the region's important shearing history at the Mooloomoon Woolshed and Pastoral History Display.
- The 15 hectare Moulamein Lake is fantastic for water skiing, sailing and all sorts of water sports. Make use of the BBQ facilities and the adjoining local swimming pool.



Day 2

TOOLEYBUC ROAD TRIP



Jump in the car and head west on the Kyalite Road for about 1 hour and you're in the river town of Tooleybuc, a well-known holiday destination for families and is a great stop-over point on the route from Adelaide to Sydney.

A vibrant riverside community with plenty of attractions to explore, Tooleybuc boasts a number of beautifully maintained parks along the river that make for fabulous lunch or rest stops with plenty of amusement on offer for the kids.


Stop by the Tooleybuc Sports Club to see the Giant Mallee Root (the biggest stump in NSW and second largest in the world according to the Guinness World Records) and learn all about the rare and endangered Dinosaur Ant. Another must see is the heritage listed Tooleybuc Bridge that crosses the Murray River into Victoria. It's a timber truss and steel lift-span bridge of technical significance for its sophisticated design and construction. It was the last of a series of bridges over the Murray River that incorporated central lift spans with innovative truss spans, which still operates today. It is still in operation.

Now it's decision time. Three fabulous lunch options: The classic pub-style menu at the Tooleybuc Sports Club, a self-catered picnic at Mensforth Park, just next to the historic bridge, or hold out for another 15 minutes for a burger you'll never forget...

If you opt for burgers head south to the small township of Koraleigh for a massive, unforgettable burger. People travel many miles for a Koraleigh burger, with a rotating menu of specials including parma burgers, Cubanos, pizza burgers and more. You may never eat again!

On your way back from Koraleigh to Tooleybuc, look out for a sign to the Koraleigh Ring Tree on the right-hand side of the road. Part of the ancient customs of the Wadi Wadi people of the area, rings are formed by binding and training branches to grow in a ring shape over time. Ring trees marked boundaries and other important sites. This rare example is a large tree standing 10 metres from the road.

When you arrive back in Tooleybuc, unwind by enjoying the peace and quiet of the Tooleybuc River and finish your way with a class country grub at the Moulamein Tatts hotel.



Day 3

TAKE IN THE MAJESTY OF THE AUSTRALIAN BUSH



Get ready for another road trip, again head west but turn North on Yanga Way. In an hour you'll hit one of NSW's newest national parks - Yanga National Park.

The park is where campers come to unwind and enjoy a choice of natural settings complemented by new visitor facilities. There's ample free camping for tents, RVs and caravans, and visitors can enjoy fabulous fishing in the Murrumbidgee River or bird watching just off the highway at Yanga Lake.

The Yanga Lake Red Gum Bird Hide attracts over 150 species of birds and offers some of the most spectacular birdwatching in NSW. Accessed along Yanga Lake walking track, it's a great destination for families and nature-lovers alike. Combining impressive scenic views and superb birdwatching this is the perfect spot to have a picnic, unwind and get away from it all. Nestled amongst the river red gums and old man saltbush, the hide is ideal to watch the pelicans and black swans as they forage for food and bring up their young in these majestic waterways.

Once you've had a meander around the lake don't miss the historic charm of nearby Yanga Homestead. Explore the wonderful Yanga Homestead and return to a time when Yanga was one of the Riverina's most productive pastoral stations.

Yanga Station was one of the oldest and largest properties in the Riverina, established in the 1840's. These days, as a national park, it celebrates both its pastoral history and natural wonders. You can even give yourself a guide tour by picking up an audio guide from the Yanga National Parks Office.

Return to Moulamein and finish off your day by throwing in a line. Both the Billabong Creek and the Edward River run through the center of town, with some of the best fishing spots in the area.



Day 4

PULL ON YOUR WALKING SHOES




Start your day by taking a delightful stroll at the old Moulamein Courthouse, perched at the end of the footbridge across Billabong Creek. The courthouse served the region from 1848 until 1968. The current structure was built in 1890.

Head back across the bridge and left along the creek until you hit the Edward River. There's a historic wharf here, with signs describing its use and talks of the old punt that used to ferry people and cargo across the river. Just across the road there's a park with picnic and barbecue facilities, in case you want to stop for a bite to eat. If you need supplies, take a quick stroll up Morago Street – you'll find whatever you need.

Back along the river for a short walk to Moulamein Road. Just one block north and you'll find the new Moulamein Heritage Village. Head south along the Edward River and you'll find yourself on the Moulamein River Walk. Following the Edward River and Billabong Creek take this signed self-guided tour with storyboards depicting the region's rich history and environment.

This peaceful walk along the Edward River takes you through river gum trees; it's a perfect location to spot native wildlife such as kangaroos, emus, goannas, bearded dragons, and kookaburras just to name a few. However the best is yet to come, with the 'Big Tree' is Moulamein's best site not to be missed. Considered culturally significant with Traditional Indigenous owners. The age of the tree is estimated to be between 500 years and 1000 years and measures 11.6 metres in circumference.

Finish up your time in Moulamein and head back home having enjoyed culture and environment.
